The Spring 2022 Used Book Sale was a HUGE success thanks to the many hours of hard work by dedicated AAUW Midland Branch members. We surpassed last Fall's Friday record with over \$12,800 in sales. Saturday and Sunday were also steady. This sale grossed over \$18,400...not quite as much as last Fall but still exceptionally high. After expenses, our estimated profits should be around \$15,600.

Thousands of books were donated. We started with 315 banana

boxes and had only about 40 banana boxes left at the end of the sale.

Remembering Betty Chenoweth Jane Wirth

Betty Chenoweth was a remarkable woman! She was a chemist, a feminine activist, a master of parliamentary procedure, a hand bell player, an avid gardener, a school board member, a life member of AAUW, the director of the SVSU bookstore, and as a result the initiator of our branch used book sales. There were few challenges that Betty wasn't willing to tackle.

When it became apparent that paperback books could be displayed better on shelves for the used book sales, she convinced her husband to build the A-frame shelves that are still used to this day. The barrels that are used to collect books for the sales were painted in Betty's garage and stored in her basement. She delivered them to the collection sites in her ample-sized vehicle.



Gardening was one of her pastimes. She had a garden that would have challenged many a fellow and she planted currents and berries on the other side of her house.

Education was important to Betty; she served on the Midland Public Schools board of education from 1974 to 1986 and held the offices of President, Vice President and Secretary. Subsequently she served the branch as Bd of Ed Liaison by attending board meetings and keeping the branch informed.

She gave much to AAUW becoming a life member early in her membership tenure. Not only did she serve the branch in several leadership capacities including 3 times as branch co-president, she was also active at the state level. The branch named Betty a named gift honoree in 1971.

It took something major to slow her down—a stroke—that left her right side compromised. Not to be deterred, she continued to use her computer using only her non-dominant hand—her left hand! Her brain continued to function and her fellow branch members consulted it often. We salute the legacy Betty has left us and we will miss her cheerfulness, her bright ideas, her kindness and her many talents. *Thank you, Betty*!!
